Your letter request of May 7th, at hand. The following facts seem to be the information desired.

I was born November 7, 189%, near Olen Allan (Walker County) Alabana. I served in the Army of the United States from April 18, 1917 to July 31, 1919, attaining rank as "Sargeant First Class Senior Grade" with Co. A, 182 Infantry, 36th Division.

I attended common grade schools in Alabama and Arkansas; high school at "Hot Springs High School", Hot Springs, Arkansas; Colorado College at Colorado Springs, Colorado. Majored in Electrical Engineering. Graduated from "Bliss Electrical School" Washington D. C. in 1923.

I was then employed by Union Gas and Electric Co. in Cincinnati, Ohio for three years as Construction Engineer.

I was then employed by Colorado Fuel and Iron Co. at Fueble, Colorado for three years as Armature Winder.

I traveled as Construction Serviceman for General Slectric Co. of Denver, Colorado until the completion of the Monolith Portland Cement Company plant near Laramie, Byoming in July 1929.

I went to work for the Union Pacific Railroad Co. August 12, 1929. Since which date, my service for the railroad has been unbroken to date.

Being discharged July 31, 1919, I was married August 11, 1919 to Miss Lydia Eather Humphreys at Not Springs, Arkansas. Born to our union were four contiduent, two come and two daughters, Paul G.B. Jr., 28, Maintenance Mechanic U.S. Cival Service at Fort Francis L. warren, Wro., the youngast son James C.D., 19, is furning near Royal, Arkansas; oldest daughter is MayTLG., 17, junion student at Semior High School in Cheyenne, Wyoning; youngest daughter Kittle R.L., 13, seventh grade at Junior High School, Cheyenne, Wyoning

Paul's sister Mary provided the following information about Paul's family, much of which she acquired from a cousin Linda in Alabama, a granddaughter of Paul's Aunt Gertie. Linda's mother was Aunt Gertie's daughter Louise who died two or three years ago.

On his dad's side, the Sprinkle family, Paul's great-great-great-great grandfather, Peter Sprenckel, was born in 1704 in Rheinland Pfalz, Germany. He died in 1759 and is buried in York County, Pennsylvania. He and his wife (maiden name unknown) possibly immigrated to Ireland with their three children, Michael, Peter II and George. (Paul's father Golie and Aunt Gertie told stories of their ancestors coming from Ireland.)

In 1734 Peter Sprenckel II, Paul's great-great grandfather, was born, and in 1770, his son Samuel Sprenkle (note the different spelling), Paul's great-great grandfather, was born in Surry County, North Carolina. Samuel and his wife Ruth Norman further changed the spelling of the family name to Sprinkle for all of their eleven children. In 1822 their fifth child Nathan Sprinkle, Paul's great-grandfather was born in Wilkes County, North Carolina. Nathan married Sophia Dozier, and one of their sons, John Henry Sprinkle was Paul's grandfather.

Emma died when Golie was only sixteen years old. After Emma's death, John Henry Sprinkle married a lady named Delphia Ann (Donahue) Boston and they had five children: Desdie Mae Sprinkle, Elsic, Cecil, Virginia and Margaret (birth and death dates unknown.)

On Paul's Mother's side, the Humphreys family, his mother Lydia Esther's parents were Kittie Clyde (Muncrief) Humphreys Born December 14, 1869 Died Nov. 28,1950 and Richard Alexander Humphreys Born November 4, 1855 Died Aug. 15, 1935.


Paul's parents Golie Benton Sprinkle and Lydia Esther Humphreys married on

Dolores Baker Gilland, Paul's Aunt Gertie's youngest daughter who is still living in Jasper, Alabama, wrote the following: "The grandparents of Nathan Sprinkle came as immigrants from Ireland to America by ship across the Atlantic. Nathan's son, John Henry Sprinkle, is of particular interest to me, because he was my grandfather. I have no knowledge of most of those children (John Henry's siblings), but I do have a little knowledge of a few of them. John's brother Billy Sprinkle drove a wagon train west from the Carolinas. He never returned. Jim Sprinkle fell in love with and married a Pawnee Indian maiden. She was called by the nieces and nephews Aunt Pawn. I don't know what her name was. John Henry Sprinkle bargained with a Mr. Wilbanks from Alabama to help drive a wagon train west. The group was to leave from Alabama and go west. John Henry left the Carolinas and came to Alabama for the trip west. He at some point fell in love with the wagon master's daughter, Emma Louise Wilbanks, married her and settled in Alabama.

Nathan Sprinkle, father of John Henry, fought in the Civil War, the War Between the States, on the side of the Confederacy. He walked, and probably rode a horse part way, from his homestead to the battle front to fight in the war. After a few months on the battle front he received word that his beloved wife Sophia was seriously ill. He requested permission to go visit her, for he feared she would die before he could see her. He was denied permission to go to her. Well, he was determined to see her before she died, so he went A.W.O.L. He walked many, many miles through forest and wilderness, keeping out of sight, to get to her bedside. He arrived safely after several days and nights of walking.

Upon seeing him, his wife's serious condition began to mend. She did not die. Later, while he was there with her, someone brought word that soldiers were approaching nearby. He ran out of the old log home into the woods behind the house. It was almost dark and he hid either behind a hollow log or inside it, I don't know which, while the Confederate soldiers searched for him. During their search, two of the soldiers stepped over the log where he lay and never saw him. They finally gave up the search and left. He spent a short time with his beloved wife (now on the mend) and then returned voluntarily to the battle front where he remained in battle until the end of the war."
